Greetings Fellow Servants,

In his classic book, "A Road Less Traveled" which is a blend of psychology and spirituality, author M. Scott Peck, shares in his first sentence: "life is difficult." I am sure we all can agree that life is difficult. Based on various elements: our environment, our family, friends, etc., life's difficulties could be placed on a continuum.

Another obvious immutable truth is that life encompasses both desirable and undesirable change. In his movie, "Heartbreak Ridge," Clint Eastwood's constant one-liner: "improvise, adapt, overcome" seems like a relevant strategy for change. Of course, change has to do with what a change entails, and the impact to us personally dictates the degree of our resistance, adoption or abandonment of a change or the organization in which the change occurs.

Recently, we were afforded an opportunity that focused on policy, but more specifically on integrity. We could have decided to maintain a years-long practice that was out of the Riverbanks, or adopt a change that resulted in returning to the Riverbanks and maintaining integrity. I acknowledge that the change is huge. Some said: This is the way we've always done it. Some asked: We've done it this way for years, why change now? These are great questions! I'll do my best to answer those questions and share the importance of the decision.

In sum, it's not as much about past practice, as it is the integrity of the past practices and how they were aligned with the Ministry's policy. As a Ministry, we're under a microscope in terms of what and how we go about doing what we do. It's incumbent upon each of us as Christians to live up to and practice Biblical principles and the principles that support the Ministry. To do otherwise, violates each of those principles and damages the integrity of the Ministry.

To clarify any confusion, our State Chapter Operating Procedure, Section VI., Paragraph D., outlines our sub-committee leadership: Program Chair, Agape Chair, Fundraising Chair and Recruitment Chair. For years, we have operated outside of this leadership model in addition to the above Chair positions appointing a Kairos Inside Chair, and our Kairos Outside community electing a slate of officers: Chair, Vice Chair, and Secretary. Simply put, appointing a Kairos Inside Chair, and allowing a Kairos Outside election of officers were counter to our State Chapter Operating Procedure. When we operate outside the bounds of official policy, our integrity can rightfully be called into question.

Prior to assuming the State Chair role, I spoke to several volunteers with longer tenures than I, researched the SCOP and sought clarification from our CEO, Evelyn Lemly. My findings indicated a change to return us to the Riverbanks, and a place of acceptable practice and integrity was necessary. Said differently, change was necessary.

Change is difficult and uncomfortable - for me and you. And there's likely 1,000 ways to communicate change. It's been my experience, however, that regardless of the message, or the care in the delivery of the message, it will never satisfy everyone. There are no forewarnings that can

Good news! With this article I am celebrating that my hard work was successful in getting all of the Texas ACs to do the Continuing Ministry events, however several of them are not doing all the various events such as Retreats and Reunions.

I have been successful in verifying that all the KI, KO and Torch ACs in Texas are holding Continuing Ministry events except for a couple of new starts and they have plans to hold the required events. However, there are 3 KOs, 2 Torch's (1 new start) and 12 KI men ACs that did not enter information in Messenger verifying that they were having the Continuing Ministry events in 2025. Please note that all 6 KI women ACs not only held the events but also entered the information in Messenger.

The biggest problem in KAIROS Inside, KAIROS Outside, and Torch is getting all the volunteers of a weekend to attend the Reunions for the next 6 months after a weekend. It's embarrassing when only 4 to 10 of us show up for a Reunion. The same goes for the Instructional on KAIROS Inside. KO is slipping on SWAPS, and several units are doing some of them on the phone (virtual) which is better than not meeting (enter the word "Virtual" instead of "In Person" in Messenger).

I've decided to help the ACs that aren't putting the Continuing Ministry information in Messenger and the new AC members who are having to put the information in Messenger by providing the following information:

KAIROS International has training for KI and KO Continuing Ministry; however, there is none scheduled at the present time. Training for Torch Continuing Ministry is held at the team meeting #2. Once KAIROS International starts up their training (Andy Perry handles this (407/ 629-4948, Ext. 125)). To take the training you need to register for the training at: <https://mykairos.org/training.html>.

In order to access the Messenger to enter the Continuing Ministry events you go to:

www.kairosmessenger.org.

The AC Secretary has a code from KAIROS International to get into Messenger. The only members of the AC that can enter Continuing Ministry information into Messenger for the AC are the Secretary, Vice Chair, Continuing Ministry Coordinator, and Data Coordinator.

The qualified AC Board Members who can enter the information in messenger will go to the link on your computer at:

www.kairosmessenger.org, then go to Programs, then go to Continuing Ministry, then select the option you want to enter (KI, KO and Torch). When you select the option, it will list the events at the top of the list (with most recent at the top of the list). Now enter the new event information and the Event Entry Screen appears. The State, AC and ministry will automatically appear. The "Type Event" selection appears automatically. You enter the date of event, type of event (Prayer and Share, etc.), type of gathering (in person, virtual,) # of participants, of Kairos Team members, and # of Inside Council (Inmates Council). You save the information by then clicking the "SAVE" button. This will return you to the listing screen and the newly added entry will be added.

Please note that in KO the participants are the "Guests;" and the Volunteers are the "Team Members." Guests become Team Members when they work on the Team for a weekend.

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adequately prepare us for change. It's not until the change is shared that we feel the impact, and formulate a response. Next comes our decision whether or not to adopt the change immediately, later, or if at all.

My prayer is that everyone reading this message at some point soon, if not already, can understand the need for the change and assimilate it into their Kairos life. The integrity of the Ministry depends on it.

We have many blessings for which to be thankful! At our 1st Quarter meetings, we embraced different changes: sharing State Chapter reports, discussing issues at the Friday Executive Committee meeting, and on Saturday gathered at and getting to know each other at The Table. We were seated by regions including members of all three programs at the same tables for the first time in years where we got to know one another and discussed leadership qualities: Inspirational, Guiding vs. Telling, Influence vs. Power, Coaching and Service before self.

During our meeting, we also talked about the term unity and using Ephesians 4:3, "Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace" as a basis. Our Spiritual Director, Marvin Schick, pointed out the term unity being embedded in the term **community**. As a community, I shared my belief that we're very good at unity inside the prisons with our participants, and at our campsites with our guests. There, we're also good at listen, listen, love, love. Can we, however, be better at that with each other? I truly believe we can, we should and we will!

Thanks to all who have reached out with your thanks, support, and feedback! Your thanks and support means more than I can adequately express, and your feedback is a gift! Please keep all three coming!

The following were Open Mike comments from the participants:

- As a prisoner for years, I have felt like a castaway. I always wake up with nightmares. I constantly complain about the situation. But you all showed to be more grateful and not complain, but to praise God. You brought me back to where I have not been in a long while, to a family. Thank God for bringing me back to this point. He quoted from Luke 15:10, 'I once was lost, but now I'm found...'

- We always have opportunities to change. I had a strong faith-family but was raised around a lot of violence. I had a choice to make, the righteous path or the path of darkness. I chose darkness. A lot of hurts in my life. I searched for ways to end the hurt. Finally, I found it in Christ. On the right path now. God does for others what we cannot do for ourselves. I am so thankful..

- First time experiencing anything like this. The letters really touched me. Never have I received this many letters or so many prayers. Everyone has shown me love. By the grace of God I am here.

- Lots of good things said and I do not know how to follow? I look around and everyone is "chatty." Thank God for the camaraderie. Prison is scary, hard to trust anyone in prison. A lot of false people. I feel different today. I do not feel like I'm in prison.

- First I want to give God thanks and gratitude. I'm 45 years old and been in for 20 years. My walk has shown me all sacrifices I made are not in vain. This Kairos is my confirmation. I prayed to get out of prison. God sent me here for a reason. I now know and feel if it's the will of God I have to accept it. Are you willing to confront that dude in the mirror everyday? God is all you got.

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Happy New Year Kairos of Texas! Moving into 2026 has come with changes within Kairos of Texas. We have new officers within our 67 Advisory Councils and new officers in the State Executive Committee. Brothers and Sisters, let us unify in our ministry as we all witness and experience the Goodness of God. God is moving in Kairos of Texas!

A few important reminders:

- When joining the Quarterly Meetings via ZOOM, sign in with your name and/or Advisory Council name. **Don't sign in with just a phone number or using an alias, such as "Buttercup 123".** Attendance for you or your AC is not counted if the secretary doesn't know who you are.
- The AC Chair is a representative of the State Chapter Committee. The AC Chair reports activity, issues, and input to the Kairos of Texas (state chapter) on behalf of the Advisory Council. The AC Chair reports activity, direction and information from Kairos of Texas to the Advisory Council. **If the AC Chair is unable to attend scheduled meetings, they should have a representative attend the meeting in their place.** Attendance is taken and includes members present as well as those absent.
- State Chapter Committee Meetings are held four times during each calendar year. It is expected that all persons attend all four meetings in person. **ZOOM should be used for no more than ½ the required Quarterly Meeting attendance.**
- Kairos of Texas State Chapter Committee and Executive Committee minutes are sent to all Advisory Council Chairs. **Please distribute the minutes among your community members.**
- IMPORTANT: Three AC units have not entered their November elections into KairosMessenger.

Divine love enables us to forgive, serve generously, and restore those who have fallen.

1 Corinthians 13:1-13

Yesterday, we saw that agape, or unconditional love, empowers us to respond calmly to difficulties, show patience while waiting, and sacrifice without complaint. We demonstrate agape when we ...

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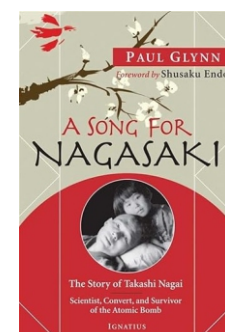
Recommended Reading

On August 9, 1945, an American B-29 dropped an atomic bomb on Nagasaki, Japan, killing tens of thousands of people in the blink of an eye, while fatally injuring and poisoning thousands more. Among the survivors was Takashi Nagai, a pioneer in radiology research and a convert to the Catholic Faith. Living in the rubble of the ruined city and suffering from leukemia caused by over-exposure to radiation, Nagai lived out the remainder of his remarkable life by bringing physical and spiritual healing to his war-weary people.

A Song for Nagasaki tells the moving story of this extraordinary man, beginning with his boyhood and the heroic tales and stoic virtues of his family's Shinto religion. It reveals the inspiring story of Nagai's remarkable spiritual journey from Shintoism to atheism to Catholicism. Mixed with interesting details about Japanese history and culture, the biography traces Nagai's spiritual quest as he studied medicine at Nagasaki University, served as a medic with the Japanese army during its occupation of Manchuria, and returned to Nagasaki to dedicate himself to the science of radiology. The historic Catholic district of the city, where Nagai became a Catholic and began a family, was ground zero for the atomic bomb.

After the bomb disaster that killed thousands, including Nagai's beloved wife, Nagai, then Dean of Radiology at Nagasaki University, threw himself into service to the countless victims of the bomb explosion, even though it meant deadly exposure to the radiation which eventually would cause his own death. While dying, he also wrote powerful books that became best-sellers in Japan. These included *The Bells of Nagasaki*, which resonated deeply with the Japanese people in their great suffering as it explores the Christian message of love and forgiveness. Nagai became a highly revered man and is considered a saint by many Japanese people.

"Christians and non-Christians alike were deeply moved by Nagai's faith in Christ that made him like Job of the Scriptures: in the midst of the nuclear wilderness he kept his heart in tranquility and peace, neither bearing resentment against any man nor cursing God."



He's looking for something. He's not sure what "it" is, but had just about decided whatever "it" is doesn't really exist. He never could find what he was looking for in his family. His father had always been abusive and never had anything positive to say to him. His mother was too heavy into drugs and nothing ever seemed to mean more to her than the next drug-induced high.

He couldn't find it in his friends. In fact, he wondered sometimes if he ever truly had any. The people he ran with were the type who seemed to be available only when you had something they wanted. They would drop you like a rock or sell you out when you no longer suited their purposes.

Now, for the last 20 years, he had been inside these prison walls. He wore the same style outfit day after day, ate horrible food, and listened to men in uniform bark orders at him on a daily basis as though he was a nobody. That really didn't bother him much. He had come to that conclusion a long time ago about himself.

But that didn't stop him from still looking for something more.

He just wasn't sure where to find it. He hadn't found it in his family. He hadn't found it in drugs. He hadn't found it in his friends. It wasn't money. What was it? What was it that was out there that could provide him a little peace, maybe even make him feel like he mattered?

There was a group of guys in his pod that were into the "Jesus" thing. They were always in corners praying or singing praise songs. He thought it was a bunch of garbage at first. . . a band-aid these guys used to get them through the day. . It allowed them to "pretend" that everything was okay and maybe even curry some small favor with the guards. Still, if it was phony... they were pretty consistent in the way they played it. He'd say that much for them.

One of them asked him to go to something called "Kairos." He wasn't sure what that was except it had to be a "Jesus" thing. But he was told there was excellent food and, he reasoned, anything would be a break from the day to-day routine of this place he had come to call "Hell." So he applied; and was accepted. Still he wasn't

sure what it would be; probably just a bunch of people who waved their hands in the air and sung about Jesus all the time. But he didn't care. It was something different . . and there would be good food.

The first day was just what he expected; a bunch of people from the "free world." asking him a bunch of questions and pretending to like him. But the second day, he started feeling something. He wasn't sure what it was at first. It felt familiar to him, like he had experienced it before but he wasn't sure what it was. Gradually, the wall he had built around himself started coming down.

Soon he found himself opening up to total strangers, including other inmates, about his life... his feelings... his fears. He actually found himself crying and, for the first time, was not ashamed to do so. He wasn't looked on as weak and the others seemed to be reaching out to him and caring anyway. It wasn't until the last night there that he figured out what it was that he was feeling. It was "love" but it was a different kind of love than he had ever felt before. This was an unconditional love. This was a love that loved him regardless of his past. This was a love that believed in his future.

This had to be the love of Jesus. And it was that night, with tears in his eyes, that he gave his heart and life to Jesus in total surrender.

Soon, the Kairos weekend was over. He was back in the prison yard. The same outfit, the same horrible food, the same guards barking orders. The situation hadn't changed.

But his heart had changed. He no longer felt alone. He didn't even feel like a prisoner. He felt free. He felt love. He had found "it," what he had been looking for all those years. He found Jesus.

Past Reflections

We are a worldwide community of volunteers, with differing talents, resources, experiences; but a common community goal, to minister to those incarcerated men and women, youth, their loved ones, and by default, the institution staff, and each other.

I've traveled a lot across this great state. It would be super if we as a Kairos community could have the same motto as Happy, Texas - "the town without a frown," but realistically we're more like Stanton, Texas - "home to 3000 friendly people and a few old soreheads." We number about 3000 volunteers, most of whom want the best for each other. But part of my reflection these past several weeks is that we have to spend so much of our time communicating what is wrong, that we lose sight of the 3000 friendly people. I would like to express my appreciation for the vast majority that "keep on keepin' on" in this ministry. You don't claim ownership, you welcome new folks into your midst, you step aside to let others share just as others step aside for you. You're willing to seek the council of others, both in your local Kairos community, but also reach out to the larger Kairos community. You share yourselves and your resources with others gladly. In short, you believe in and try to live the life that we take to those we minister to, in and out of prisons. Response, not reaction, obedience, and forgiveness are not left on the inside but rather are indistinguishable to those observing you. In the vernacular, you "talk the talk and walk the walk."

Our pastor shared the following with us on a recent Sunday that seemed so appropriate in describing my life. Maybe it fits your life or the life of the local Kairos community.

Life in Five Short Chapters - By Portia Nelson **CHAPTER 1**

I walk down the street. There's a deep hole in the sidewalk. And I fall in.

I am lost. I am helpless. It isn't my fault. It takes forever to find a way out.

CHAPTER 2

I walk down the same street. There is a deep hole in the sidewalk. I pretend I don't see it. I fall in again.

I can't believe I am in the same place. But it isn't my fault. It takes a long time to get out.

CHAPTER 3

I walk down the same street and there is a deep hole in the sidewalk. I see it there, and still I fall in.

It's a habit. But my eyes are open and I know where I am. It is my fault and I get out immediately.

CHAPTER 4

I walk down the same street. There is a deep hole in the sidewalk. I walk around it.

CHAPTER 5

I walk down a different street.

We can all walk down a different street accompanied by our Kairos families if we recognize where the "holes" are and that we're not alone in trying to get out. We have the power of prayer, the Holy Spirit, the promises of scripture that allow us to focus on the most precious gift that God could give, His Son. His commandments are really very few but are so difficult to practice all the time. Love, forgiveness, obedience, and going forth are the things that are asked of each of us. Whether in our home, our workplace, school, church, or Kairos community we are reminded that Christ is among us and that the next person we meet might have an opportunity to see Christ through us.

Where To Look

Let us run...., fixing our eyes on Jesus. (Hebrews 12:1-2)

She saw the face of evil up close and personal. She saw some of the most inhumane acts man can do to man. And when she came out of it all, she said this: "If you look at the world, you'll be distressed. If you look within, you'll be depressed. But if you look at Christ, you'll be at rest."

Where are you looking? Are you focusing on the world and its dangers? Are you gazing at yourself, hoping to find your own answers? Or are you looking to Jesus, the author and finisher of your faith (Hebrews 12:1-2)? In an uncertain world, we must keep looking to Him.
