

From the KOT State Chair

Most of us except the Financial Secretaries should have closed out our 2012 Kairos year by now and from all I can see it was a very good year. We had two new starts and a restart of Torch Amarillo. We have faced new challenges with the pressure on TDCJ to adequately secure Prisons while all able bodied officers are following the money to the oil patch and the resulting restrictions on Kairos programs.

I think 2013 will be a breakout year for Kairos Prison Ministry International, Kairos of Texas and for most all of our AD councils. Tom Kemner as the interim Executive Director did a stellar job assisting KPMI and all of our Kairos family during the transition in 2012. Now our selection committee and Board have selected Evelyn Lemly as our new KPMI Executive Director. The following article will provide you with a hint of the quality she brings to our table. We will learn much more in the upcoming year.



Here at home, we had a phenomenal January State Chapter Committee meeting with the largest state gathering ever. Chaplain Pierce provided us with a spirited vision of activities at TDCJ from the addition of more chaplains to a doubling of the Volunteer Services Staff that assist us with our application process. TDCJ is even more adamant to promote Faith based programs and even expand programs on current facilities. Bob Cole chaired a special orientation session for approximately 20 Financial Secretaries. Thomas Becker and Jim Irwin, with the assistance of John Kennell, co-chaired a first ever AD Council Chairs Introductory workshop for approximately 30 participants. The state meeting itself focused on the job of organizing our new committees and introducing new members to opportunities to serve at the state level.

Discussions at the Regions tables and at all the committee meetings were open and fruitful. We will once again see a good year of growth starting with our ladies of KO Central Texas and their # 1 weekend. Kevin Resnover, the KPMI Coordinator of Kairos Torch, will be in Texas on February 19 to finalize the formal agreements with the Harris County Juvenile Probation Department. A Torch 101 orientation program is being scheduled for the following Saturday, February 23rd in Houston. We also have serious interest in a new program at the Young Medical Facility in Dickinson by both the Chaplain and staff and a strong contingent of past Kairos volunteers.

We have seen many of our programs start using the Donor program for what it was originally designed to be; a fundraising tool. The process starts slow but is a tried and true method for raising money. Several other programs have also developed good repeatable methods of fundraising and are sharing their expertise with anyone who asks.

Our biggest challenge continues to be in Outreach, but even here we made some significant progress this last year. We now have the ability to reach more potential volunteers because we are becoming more visible at the state level and in churches heretofore not aware of our programs. I anticipate that we will have more general recruiting presentations alerting groups of potential volunteers to all our ministries at one time and encouraging cross over support from one aspect of our ministry to another. We are all a part of the same family and we can all present the big picture.

2013 will be the best year ever for Kairos in Texas!!!!



New Executive Director to Lead Kairos Prison Ministry International

Evelyn Lemly to Orchestrate 30,000 Volunteers in 10 Countries

WINTER PARK, Fla., Jan. 14, 2013 /Christian Newswire/ -- The board of directors of Kairos Prison Ministry International (www.kpmi.org) has announced the appointment of new executive director Evelyn Lemly (photo) to oversee its work in 34 states in the United States and nine international countries.

Lemly brings a diverse background in corporate business and nonprofits to her role in leading the 30,000 volunteers of Kairos. She assumed new responsibilities January 1, 2013.

"The mission and focus of Kairos Prison Ministry International resonate with God's call on my life to serve," said Lemly. "I embrace the holistic approach of Kairos that has proven successful in bringing this important segment of our society to the knowledge of the love and mercy of Jesus Christ."

Kairos Prison Ministry International focuses on three strategic approaches. Kairos Inside brings the transformational grace of Christ within prisons through initial weekend meetings and, ultimately, accountability groups and mentoring. Volunteers with Kairos Outside minister predominantly to female family members of the incarcerated and facilitate participants' re-entry into the outside world. Kairos Torch focuses on redirecting the values and life direction of youth offenders.

"We are thankful for the direction of God in sending Evelyn Lemly to join His work at Kairos," said Ed Keefer, chairperson of the Kairos board of directors. "As a proven business leader, financial manager, thinker and strategic planner, she is uniquely gifted to build upon the strengths of Kairos and to lead its wide-sweeping programs to accomplish our mission."

The board of directors, international council, subcommittees, staff and volunteers from the 10 countries served will gather in Orlando Feb. 6-9 for their semiannual meeting. In addition to business sessions, the face-to-face dialogue of partners will unify the ministry and celebrate what God has done, according to Lemly. Lemly will be installed as new executive director of Kairos Prison Ministry International at a special dinner Feb. 8.

"I am eager to build on the success of the work God has accomplished through His servants at Kairos," said Lemly. "With His help, as we go forward, we will make an even greater impact on people for Christ." *Kairos Prison Ministry International is "Changing Hearts, Transforming Lives, Impacting the World" by taking the love, grace and forgiveness of Jesus Christ to incarcerated adults and youth and their families. From simple beginnings as a short course in Christianity inside a Florida prison in 1976, Kairos has grown into an international ministry serving more than 430 facilities in 10 countries. I listen to the guys get up there and tell you how they feel when they are on their "Kairos High". I am here for when they walk out that door back into the place where peer influence is heavy. I am the guy who has already battled to be my own man. As you know, it is a battle to walk in God's path. It is also a constant battle to be a better man.

A lot of the guys will fall weak and give up just to keep friends (who aren't even real friends). But there are a group of us guys who are highly respected by the other brothers, who encourage the new brothers to discover themselves in God.

I smile because I am happy. Kairos initiated something greater than we can imagine. It helped me become a better person and man. I do still face some lonely times due to my family and old friends not trying to do the "God thing," but I am blessed because I know God, and I am real with myself. I know you guys hear "thank you" all the time, but I can't say it enough.

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Who is KAIROS? You are KAIROS. We are KAIROS! All of us, as active members of our local KAIROS community, we participate in the hands-on ministry activities fulfilling the greater purpose of KAIROS Prison Ministry International (KPMI).

We participate in a ministry that lives out a Body of Christ vision found in I Corinthians 12:12; *“The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ”*. And so it is with KAIROS which requires community participation for the long-term health of the ministry. We accomplish this by recruiting new volunteers and raising sufficient funds to finance its program. We are also called to serve with a spirit of obedience and servant-hood as found in I Corinthians 12:26; *“If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together”*. "Come now my children let me show you around."


Excitement filled the space, some skipped and some ran.

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With bills piling up, an ailing elderly relative and her own son to care for, April Terry was feeling the full brunt of her husband's imprisonment. Kairos, the Greek word meaning "in God's special time," couldn't have been a more fitting name for the prison ministry that one year ago began transforming the Terrys' lives. "I grew up in the church, but neither of us attended church" as adults, Terry said of herself and her husband. "We weren't necessarily living an obedient life before he got incarcerated; we were just living. When he got incarcerated, the changes started happening. I started going to church and getting stronger, and then he found out about Kairos. After that, it snowballed."

Kairos Prison Ministry International is a three-pronged, faith-based program whose volunteers aim to positively alter the lives of incarcerated men, women, juveniles and their loved ones with weekend spiritual retreats.

Kairos Inside brings a trained volunteer team of clergy and lay people into a prison to offer 42 of its inmates a three-day course in Christianity, according to the Kairos' website. Kairos Outside also involves lay people and clergy in a weekend, but works as a support group for the female family members of the incarcerated. Kairos Torch starts with a weekend retreat inside the prison and continues with a mentorship program for six months thereafter, according to the website. Known as KPMI, the organization is carefully structured, its curriculum set forth by a manual every Kairos program in the world uses, said Rex Mason, coordinator of regions for Kairos of Texas.

"The structure is set up so that the inmates inside the prison should not be able to tell that everybody on the team has not been there since Day 1," Mason said. "When you've got people in lots of states working from the same book, it's not always easy to get the things done that we need to. We have some additional opportunities to excel ... but we make a go of it." Mason, a Ballinger resident, began volunteering with Kairos Inside in 2000. Explaining to a nonmember the experience of being part of the Kairos team is difficult, he said, and not unlike a Navy SEAL describing to a civilian why he does what he does. "Going into a Kairos weekend is different than any ministry I have ever been involved in," he said. "It's an opportunity to walk beside the Holy Spirit and watch Him work miracles in one of the most miserable places in the country."

Terry, who lives in Big Spring, can attest to the changes Kairos invokes. More than a year ago, Terry attended Kairos Outside in Andrews while her husband participated in Kairos Inside at the prison where he is incarcerated. "My husband can be very 'it's my way or no way'," Terry said. "He's the type that doesn't apologize even if he knows he's wrong. He has really softened. He does daily devotionals now. I've been here trying to take care of the bills and his granddad and our son, and I was overwhelmed; he could tell over our phone conversation. He called me back and said, 'I have a Scripture for you.' For him to go to the Bible and say, 'This is what I want to read to you right now,' it's (proof that Kairos) just really opened him up."

For Terry, the personal changes the Kairos Outside retreat prompted were just as amazing, she said. "You are surrounded with a bunch of women that feel what you feel being the loved one of an incarcerated person," she said. "It's a chance to bond with other women who know what you're going through and continue that relationship with (them). It's great support because now there are people I met on my weekend that — if I need prayer for anything, or I'm going through a struggle — I can email them or pick up the phone and it's an automatic support."

Julie Cole, who lives in Midland and has been a Kairos volunteer since 1999, said feelings of isolation are common among women who are grappling with a loved one's incarceration. "They're embarrassed to tell people

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what's going on in their life," Cole said. "It's really sad to say that some churches, when they find out (a church member is related to an incarcerated person) really discourage them from attending. Instead of embracing them, they shun them."

Kairos Outside, however, takes the focus off the participants' loved ones and puts it back on them, Cole said.

"Most of them seem really grateful; they come with the idea that the weekend is going to be about their loved one in prison and they find out the weekend is about them," she said. "It's about making them stronger. The majority of women that come are Christians. Some are very strong Christians; some have been to church but have fallen away, and this brings them back to that. They usually all say they feel more worthy because of what they've learned during the weekend."

Terry was so touched by the love and support she received at the retreat that she decided to join the **Kairos Outside** team. "For a long time I struggled with 'Where am I supposed to be in ministry?'" she said. "As soon as the weekend was over, I said, 'This is it. This is why I have gone through what I have gone through,' and I want to give back to women what I had been given during that weekend."

"Establishing a support system also is an integral component to **Kairos Inside**," Cole said. "It's been proven: If (released inmates) don't have family or close friends, somebody to go back to, a potential job or something, their chances of success are very, very low," Cole said. "Men and women are getting out of prison every day, and those people could easily end up being our next-door neighbors. We need to teach them how to be productive, decent members of our society. It's a segment of the population that shouldn't be ignored."

While relationships — with others and, primarily, Christ — are at **Kairos'** core, Mason said the ministry is different from most like-minded Christian endeavors because it is not evangelistic. "We don't teach them a lot of Scripture," Mason said. "Some Christian people who don't know anything about it are hesitant to get involved because they think if it's not evangelistic, you're not going to get the job done. But I would guarantee that there is as much evangelism going on in the unit on a one-on-one basis as there is in any church service you might get involved in."

Added Cole: "It's an interdenominational group as opposed to nondenominational. There's Methodists, Presbyterians, Catholics (involved). We focus on what we have in common, and what we have in common is a belief of Jesus Christ. We do not do baptisms or have communion. We don't have all this peripheral extra stuff out there so it makes for a very simplistic, good weekend."

For the Terrys, **Kairos'** format was just what they needed. "It's been beneficial to our marriage, our relationship; all the way around it has really blessed us," Terry said.



Six: Build your future on high ground.


Seven: For safety's sake travel in pairs.
